### The Queen is Dead, Long Live the King



"Your Excellency,

On behalf of the ABAN family, I would like to extend our deepest condolences to the British people for the demise of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. As the longest reigning monarch in British history, she led an incredible life of service, dedication and dignity towards the British people and the world. She will always be fondly remembered for her innumerable contributions to society around the world. May the departed soul rest in peace, and the British people have the strength to deal with this significant loss."

ABAN President Mr. Uttam Pant wrote to the British Ambassador to Nepal, and also lead a team of ABAN Executives to the Embassy on September 13 to sign the condolence book on the sad demise of the Queen Elizabeth II.



### Queen Elizabeth - The Memory Remains

Queen Elizabeth II, the longest serving monarch of the United Kingdom has died at the age of 96 years (1926 April 21 to 2022 September 8). One of the legendry personality of the 20th century, Her late Majesty was famous for her graceful demeanor.

A sweet smile on her face was like an eternal sunshine in the gloomy weather of Britain. Elegance of her attire was the envy of all fashionists. Great Britain had lost its greatness after Second World War, having lost the jewel in its crown-colonial India.

Britain suffered from decades of difficulties - urban decay, rebellious coal miners, threat of communists, Islamic terrorism, and that infamous Irish Republican Army (IRA) bombing, which almost killed her.

She survived the bomb, she survived the Cord War. She survived the parasite paparazzi who hunted her family's privacy. She survived rising Republican sentiment among communist sympathizers. She survived the unreasonable uproar against her after the tragic death of her estranges daughter-in-law Dianna on August 31, 1997. She survived the corona pandemic.

Queen Elizabeth II was a great survivor. Throughout all the turbulent days, she always maintained an elusive sense of calm. Her gentle voice was calm, clear and confident. Unlike the former royalties of Nepal, notorious for ego and arrogance, Queen Elizabeth was an ocean of humility. The Nepali people have nostalgic memory of Her Majesty. She showed so much courtesy to king Mahendra when he arrived in London.

During the 70 years as the monarch of the UK, Queen Elizabeth visited Nepal twice. She had visited Nepal in 1961 at the invitation of king Mahendra, and in 1986 during the reign



of King Birendra. Always a humble and an honest Queen, she was never tempted to misuse her power even though she ruled the country for the longest period.

History will remember Queen Elizabeth as a fortress of humility and honesty. Never corrupted by power and money, never showing anger and frustration, never being swept away by cheap media publicity- she was a perfect symbol of British Christian Morality. Queen Elizabeth the Second maintained her composure and continued to shower dignity as well as decency in public life.

Nepal has some of the fondest memories of Queen Elizabeth from her visits in 1961 and in 1986. Nepal has been grieved by her demise, not only because of the enormous love she had for the people of Nepal but also because of Britain being the first country that Nepal shared a diplomatic relation in 1816 when Nepal had to sign the Sugauli Treaty.



British Prime Minister Liz Truss has rightly said that the modern Britain has been built on the foundation rock of the Queen and that she is the spirit of modern Britain.

The queen's death at Balmoral Castle, announced by Buckingham Palace at 6:30 p.m., elevated her eldest son and heir, Charles, to the throne. He is Britain's first king since 1952, taking the name King Charles III.

# **Grant Opportunities for Women Reporters on Climate Change**



#### Introduction

Are you an emerging women journalist who loves to tell stories? Are you passionate about climate change and how it impacts women and gender minorities? If yes, this opportunity might be for you.

### What's it about?

We are offering women reporters/videographers in Nepal the chance to take part in a specialized five-week virtual media workshop with an opportunity to publish their work. Experts will facilitate the sessions in journalism with national and international experts in scientific research and climate change as guest facilitators. During the workshop, participants will be mentored to develop their own stories about climate and gender, focusing on their local community and areas. They will also have the opportunity to engage with climate change experts and scientists.

As part of the workshop, the participants will be expected to write a proposal for a non-fiction story reported through any medium, with a budget proposal. The participants will then receive a grant to support the development and publication of their stories.

The participants will have the opportunity to get one-to-one mentoring from the well-experienced facilitators supported by grant awards.

Women Reporters on Climate Change is a replication of last year's successful component of the Road to COP project funded by UK Aid. It brought many women journalists from all over Nepal and gave them the platform to curate and tell their stories. It is a result of the <a href="British Council research">British Council research</a> and the Nepal research looking at two decades of climate change reporting in Nepal which shows discrepancies in how gender intersections are covered and reflects the need to promote the role of women in global climate action.
